### **Agenda Item 10: Carmarthen Town Council Flag Protocol**

## ***CARMARTHEN TOWN COUNCIL FLAG PROTOCOL***

*This protocol outlines Carmarthen Town Council’s approach to the flying of flags on Council premises. It sets out to provide certainty in respect of which flags are to be flown and when. The protocol also makes clear what the appropriate occasions are and which alternative flags are to be flown additional to the Welsh national flag.*

*The Welsh national flag should be permanently flown outside St Peter’s Civic Hall and at Carmarthen Park.*

*The Mayor will have discretion to fly other flags on the following occasions:*

- *To celebrate and support cultural events of significance such as St Davids Day or a major sporting event*

- *In recognition of a royal visit or formal visit to the town by a significant dignitary*
- *Any other reasonable grounds*

*Flying Flags at Half Mast:*

*In the event of the death of the monarch, flags should be flown at half-mast throughout the period of mourning in accordance with 'Operation London Bridge'. All flags to return to normal by 9am the day after the funeral.*

*The Mayor will have discretion to fly flags at half mast on other occasions.*

#### **Introduction**

The Management Committee meets routinely, as and when required.</p> <p>The Council employs 18 full or part time members of staff, and the Clerk of the Town Council is Mr Alun Harries. **Carmarthen Town Council** is responsible for many services in the town, including:

- Carmarthen Park, incorporating the tea shop, velodrome and rugby ground;
- Other public parks in Carmarthen including Johnstown Park, Penllwyn Park, Parc Hinds and the play areas at Russell Terrace, Maes y Wennol and Allt Ioan;
- Most of the town's public footpaths;
- St Peter's Civic Hall;
- Carmarthen Cemetery;
- Footway lighting across the town;
- Events and activities including the annual Christmas lights 'switch on' and reindeer parade, the Carmarthen Town Sports Awards, the Mayor's Races on May bank holiday, and the St David's Day celebrations in the town centre;
- Activities and events held at Carmarthen Park throughout the year, including the extensive summer programme of entertainment and facilitating the Winter Wonderland;
- The town's hanging basket scheme and other floral displays;
- Providing financial grants and other support for local organisations and good causes.

Since 2018 Carmarthen Town Council has been recognised by One Voice Wales for its high level of service and performance in a number of areas, as follows:

- Best Heritage Project (Carmarthen Velodrome Redevelopment) - **Winner**
- Best Sustainability Initiative (Red Court Solar Farm Grants Scheme) - **Winner**

The Local Government and Elections (Wales) Act 2021 was implemented in January 2021, and many of the Act's provisions have implications for town and community councils across Wales. Some of the Act's requirements do not come into place until later during 2022, but the following have already been introduced by CTC:

## FINANCIAL SUMMARY 2021/22

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Council's operations started to recover from the effects of the Covid pandemic seen in the previous year. While income was not back to normal, the hire of St Peter's Hall, the velodrome and the rugby and football pitches was able to continue during the year. Confidence has grown during the year and by the end of the year, bookings were increasing. Council was fortunate to benefit from Welsh Government funding of £4,983 towards the Christmas celebrations in town, which included the Christmas lights switch on event and the reindeer parade.

The **Council Precept** is the main source of Council income and represents the amount of council tax paid by households in Carmarthen that is allocated to the Town Council. The annual precept (£138.42 per Band D household) raised a total of £779,129 for the Town Council during 2021/22 (the Town Council does not receive anything from business rates). It also received income from the provision of its services such as:

Carmarthen Cemetery: £65,012

Carmarthen Park Tea Shop: £43,735

Parks (including velodrome): £5,451

Other income received was £25,594 giving total income for 2021/22 of £918,922.

The Council retains **reserves** of £150,000 to deal with unforeseen contingencies and emergencies.

- Procurement of Replacement Vehicle for the Maintenance Team - £10,750
- Defibrillators – £2,415

LocalMotion</p>	<p>LocalMotion is a totally new concept featuring a group of private investors who have identified Carmarthen as one of 6 towns and cities across the UK (it is the only location in Wales) who will benefit from an initial £350,000 (eighteen-month investment in the town from February 2022 to September 2023). It will be followed by an eight-year investment until 2030. A large number of stakeholders including the Town Council are members of the group and significant sums of money are earmarked to be invested on different projects. Currently ‘Llais Caerfyrddin’ is being developed and will be a strategic town engagement project linking with residents from housing estates, intergenerational groups, and organisations. Consultation is the key objective of this project, ensuring that this engagement empowers the future work of LocalMotion in the community. Llais Caerfyrddin will visit communities all over the town and engage to develop an idea of what people want for Carmarthen. A large community event is also being planned, to bring a vibrant art-based feel to Carmarthen. Talks, exhibitions, workshops, and educational links to colleges and schools are all being planned for this large-scale event. Working together is exciting and challenging, therefore we all have to be mindful of respecting the process. Hopefully after these initial trials in the first eighteen months, we can take stock of what is possible and develop the future LocalMotion projects in the town.</p>	
	<p>4. Public Realm – Appearance of the town centre</p>	<p>The Town Council continues to play a leading role in ensuring the town looks at its best for its residents and visitors. It is responsible for all of the local parks and most of the floral displays in the town centre. It also has a role in highlighting and co-ordinating concerns about matters outside of its scope of responsibility via the Town Centre Recovery Group and its membership of the Public Realm Sub-Group of the Town Regeneration Forum.</p> <p>The Town Council provides the hanging basket scheme and other floral displays that brighten up the appearance of the town and help to attract visitors and shoppers to the town from southwest Wales and beyond. 		<p>businesses affected by the pandemic the Town Council once again provided over 150 baskets free of charge during the year.</p> <p>In February 2022, the Mayor led a 'Spring Clean' campaign that resulted in the Town Council working very effectively with its key partners from Carmarthenshire County Council and very many volunteers and other organisations to undertake litter picks and street cleaning initiatives. This has taken place during recent months and many volunteers continue to carry out litter picks across the local area. The initiative proved to be very successful indeed, and it is planned to continue with this sort of focussed campaign every year.</p>	
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## **Biodiversity Duty Report to Welsh Government**

### ***Environment (Wales) Act 2016 Part 1 - Section 6 Biodiversity and Resilience of Ecosystems Duty Report***

- The Council provides a range of local services and manages a number of green spaces. These include several public parks, play areas and Carmarthen Cemetery. A butterfly garden was created at Carmarthen Park during 2020 and wild flowers were also seeded on the banks of the velodrome.
- The Council published a 'Biodiversity and Environment Development Action Plan' in September 2018 and it also has a Council Sub-Committee - Sian Johnston Committee - which deals specifically with matters relating to the environment and sustainability. This makes recommendations to the Town Council on these matters. **This Action Plan will be reviewed by CTC following the local elections in May 2022.**

**Appendix A: 5 Ways of Working**

<b>Long Term</b> The importance of balancing short-term needs with the need to safeguard the ability to also meet long-term needs.
<b>Prevention</b> How acting to prevent problems occurring or getting worse may help public bodies meet their objectives.
<b>Integration</b> Considering how the public body’s well-being objectives may impact upon each of the well-being goals, on their other objectives, or on the objectives of other public bodies.
<b>Collaboration</b> Acting in collaboration with any other person (or different parts of the body itself) that could help the body to meet its well-being objectives.
<b>Involvement</b> The importance of involving people with an interest in achieving the well-being goals and ensuring that those people reflect the diversity of the area which the body serves.
